School Kit Lutheran World Relief

The school kits contain essential supplies to help children learning while facing serious obstacles. That learning leads to a better life for the students, their families, and their communities. Tanzania/Haiti Mission Trips

The purpose of the Tanzania and Haiti mission trips is to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ, to extend Christian hospitality, and to strengthen relationships with one another through the shared practices of prayer, presence, and projects. We are committed to pray for those we visit every day; and they, in turn, pray for us. We support each other by attending worship services together at each other's churches, sharing meals in each other's homes, and learning about each other's culture. We assist them with projects through consultation with their leaders on project details; by offering physical assistance (e.g. installing a sound system, helping with construction and maintenance, etc.); and by providing financial assistance through fundraisers. Donations to the Bethel Tanzania Scholarship fund help 40-50 students attend Iringa Diocese high schools each year, which not only aids the student, but also impacts the entire family.
